Bir Lachit Sena

Assam Rising
Guwahati, August 12:

Assam police on Friday arrested a member of Bir Lachit Sena and an off-duty home guard for allegedly misbehaving with them in Charaideo district. The arrested Bir Lachit Sena member has been identified as Rupjyoti Phukan, while the home guard has been identified as one Pankaj Hazarika. The incident has been reported from Sapekhati near Sonari town. Sources said the duo allegedly intervened a police operation in the area and misbehaved with them using vulgar language, after which they were taken into custody. The reason behind the escalation is yet to be ascertained.

Cattle heads

Assam Police rescued a total of 43 cattle heads in two separate incidents in the state, officials informed on Friday. As many as 29 cattle heads were rescued after Police intercepted a truck on suspicion of illegal cattle head smuggling on Friday in Assam's Khetri. Police seized the truck with the registration number AS 02 CC 2289 and arrested two suspects. The accused were identified as Azizul Islam and Shahidul Ali, residents of Samaguri in Nagaon district. Along with the truck, police also seized a Terrano car with registration number AS 01 BP 9339. According to the police sources, the truck was following the seized car.

Rape attempt

Two persons were arrested for alleged rape attempt on a mentally-challenged girl in Assam's Majuli on Friday. Following the incident, local police arrested the duo and registered a case under relevant sections against them. The accused have been identified as Sanjeev Das and Raj Das. On Tuesday, a 60-year-old man was arrested for allegedly raping a minor girl in Guwahati's Noonmati area.

Chief Minister Himanta Sarma Urged Aamir Khan To Postpone Assam Visit

While Hindi movie superstar Aamir Khan's new release Lal Singh Chaddha is in the headlines, Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma today said that Mr Khan wanted to visit Assam this week, but since the state is observing the

'Har Ghar Tiranga' initiative from August 13 to 15, he asked him to postpone his proposed visit to a later date. Sources said that Mr Khan wanted to visit Guwahati on August 14 to promote his movie. He is now expected to visit on August 16. "Aamir Khan wanted to come here and even spoke to me. But because this time the focus

is on Independence Day and the whole Tiranga initiative and its significance, so we did not want it to get diluted. Therefore I requested him to postpone and to come after Independence Day," Mr Sarma told reporters in Guwahati. He added that they speak to each other on phone often so the actor will visit whenever he invites him. Whenever Aamir Khan visits, the Chief Minister will also watch the film with him and his entire crew if they all come to Assam, Mr Sarma has told the actor, sources said. Aamir Khan had re-

cently donated to flood relief in the state, earning public praise from the Chief Minister. On June 27 this year, Himanta Biswa Sarma tweeted "Eminent Bollywood actor Aamir Khan extended a helping hand to the flood-affected people of our State by making a generous contribution of ₹ 25 lakh towards CM

Relief Fund. My sincere gratitude for his concern and act of generosity". Often called Bollywood's "Mr Perfectionist," Khan had last visited the state nearly 10 years ago and had stayed in Tezpur in the northern part. His latest movie, "Laal Singh Chaddha," released on August 11.

Dhula 13-yr-old female unnatural death: CM visits family in Dhekiajuli

Tezpur, August 12:

Chief Minister Dr. Himanta Biswa Sarma today ordered the immediate suspension of Darrang Superintendent of Police (SP) Rajmohan Ray, Additional SP Rupam Phukan and the Dhula Police Station Officer in charge over allegations the district police top brass mishandled the June 11 case of unnatural death of 13-year-old girl at the Dhula residence of one Krishna Kamal Baruah. The Chief Minister's order came on the backdrop of his visit

today to the Dhekiajuli residence of the deceased, who was found hanging by the neck. Accompanied by Director General of Police Bhaskar Jyoti Mahanta, the Chief Minister interacted with the relatives of the deceased and inquired about the allegations they had leveled against Darrang police administration. It has been alleged that the police displayed extreme dereliction of duty in collecting photographic and videographic evidence of the incident. It has been further

Monkeypox Outbreak: Study Documents First Human-to-Dog

Paris, August 12:

French researchers have documented the first case of a dog with a confirmed monkeypox virus infection that may have been transmitted through a human. Published in the medical journal The Lancet, a team from the Sorbonne University in Paris recorded the case of monkeypox virus in two sexually active men: an HIV-positive Latino man, aged 44 years, living with undetectable viral loads on antiretrovirals; and an HIV-negative white man, aged 27 years. Twelve days after the onset of



monkeypox symptoms, their male Italian greyhound, aged 4 years and with no previous medical disorders, tested positive for the virus. Both men are non-exclusive partners who live in the same house. They developed anal skin ulcers six days after having sex with other

partners. The Latino man developed an Anal skin ulcer followed by a rash on his face, ears, and legs. The white man had it on the legs and back. Rash was associated with weakness, headaches and fever after 4 days in both cases. The dog, who was co-sleeping with the men, presented with mucocutaneous (involving both typical skin and mucous

membrane) lesions, including red, tender bumps with white pus on the abdomen and an anal skin ulcer. The team sequenced monkeypox virus DNA from the dog and the Latino man and found that the samples contained virus of the hMPXV-1 clade, lineage B.1, which has been spreading in non-endemic countries since April. "To the best of our knowledge, the kinetics of symptom onset in both patients and, subsequently, in their dog suggest human-to-dog transmission of monkeypox virus," Sophie Seang, from the University's Infectious Diseases Department, along with her team wrote in the paper.

Washington, August 12:

In an unprecedented search conducted on the premises of former US President Donald Trump earlier this week in Florida, the FBI agents were looking for documents relating to nuclear weapons, according to The Washington Post report, which was neither denied or confirmed by the US Justice Department, which oversees the FBI. The newspaper sourced the report to multiple officials "all unidentified" involved in the investigation but gave no further details of the kind of nuclear weapons' documents sought by the agents. Government officials are reportedly worried that these documents could fall in the wrong hands at Trump's Florida home that is also a club fre-



quented by members. The report says that Donald Trump has held on to an undisclosed volume of documents from his presidency that he is required to have turned in for archiving by the government. The National Archive, which is the repository of these documents, has been following up with him and his aides for months. The FBI agents searched Trump's home in an unprecedented first for a US President on Monday, according to a statement from Trump, who called it a "raid" in a political play to both discredit it and

rile up his base with a familiar story of victimhood he had used against the Russia investigation and his double impeachment. As allies and followers predictably poured scorn and outrage on the "raid", Trump and his lawyers did not tell them and the country the details that were available to them by way of the search warrant issued by a federal judge, which would have contained the grounds for it, or the itemized list of articles taken by the FBI "at least 15 boxes" that were duly provided to them. For US president was once again the hounded hero for his followers "including many lawmakers" who had no idea why his premises were searched. US Attorney General Merrick

Seven college students suspended after their hugging video goes viral

Guwahati, August 12:

Seven students of a college in Assam have been suspended after being caught indulging in an "inappropriate act" in the classroom. A group of boys and girls from Class 11 of the college were hugging and poking each other in the classroom. Another student of the same class recorded the video and later uploaded

it on the social media. The incident happened in Ramanuj Gupta College of Silchar, a private-run institute in the state. The video went viral and netizens criticised the students' behaviour. Some also blamed the college authority. The videos came to the notice of the college authorities on Wednesday, and seven students were immediately barred from attending college. Out of seven, four were girls and

three were boys. The college authority has issued notice to the students saying that they were visibly indulged in acts of turpitude. Such types of activities are tantamount to gross violation of discipline of the institution. Therefore, the following erring students were suspended from attending the classes for an indefinite period. Principal of the college, Purnadeep Chanda told IANS: "The students did this turpitude

Liz Truss is easy to mock, but she could do more damage than Boris Johnson ever did

Liz Truss loves maths. She loves it so much that she used to fire mental arithmetic questions at civil servants during meetings, and once told an audience of female high-flyers that her best advice for their ambitious daughters was to study the subject. She loves maths so much, indeed, that she approaches political decisions like an equation to be solved. The maths professor's daughter works methodically through every possible option, including some that others would consider beyond the pale; she likes to test every argument, sometimes to exhausting lengths. (As one of her aides used to joke: what's the difference between a rottweiler and Liz Truss? A rottweiler eventually lets go.) Her logical, dispassionate mathematician's approach makes her a formidable negotiator and an unsentimental strategist, swift to abandon positions that no longer serve her. Yet those who know her best say that with it comes a curious emotional detachment, or inability to factor into her calculations how things feel to other people, which is only now being exposed. She can be good company in private, funny and lively. But when colleagues mention her "faintly awkward" manner, or even call her "as close to properly crackers as anybody I've met in parliament" (Dominic Cummings, no stranger himself to being called something simi-



lar), this particular disconnectedness is often what they mean. It's shaped the campaign of the woman still most likely to be Britain's next prime minister, barring a political earthquake, and may soon shape this country's future. The first slip was her regional pay policy, ditched amid predictable outrage at the thought of lower salaries for teachers and nurses in the north of the country. The second and most serious was pledging to help with fuel bills by lowering taxes, "not giving out handouts". (She now claims both policies were misunderstood, and that she wasn't ruling out direct grants.) Even those sympathetic to Truss expect a U-turn on those handouts, in a climate where focus group participants talk about moving their elderly parents in with them for the winter because it's the only way everyone can afford to keep warm. "Politics is about emotions, it's not a mathematical equation,"

Gurgaon mein jahaan aakhri mall khatam hoti hai na, udhar hi tumhari democracy aur constitution bhi khatam ho jaati hai (Where the last mall in Gurgaon ends, the rule of democracy and the constitution ends as well)." This one dialogue delivered aptly by a rustic Haryana cop in the 2015 movie NH10 succinctly describes the limitations of modernity and modern institutions in India. The character playing the police officer goes on to explain that we drive on the left because Ambedkar's Constitution mandates this, but in rural India, it's the writ of Manusmriti that prevails. But this dialogue is a half-truth. Recent series of events in Noida, a New Delhi suburb, where a woman resident was publicly abused and threatened by a 'rustic' local leader, has shown that India is changing for good and the writ of the Constitution and democracy are definitely going beyond the last shopping mall. At the same time, the malls are also mushrooming far beyond the city centres. Urban rich are rightfully claiming their higher position in the hierarchy, and the rural feudal rich are feeling the pinch. With these changes, the limits and horizons of democracy and the Constitution are also expanding. After all, as former BJP MP late Dilip Singh Judev famously said: "Paisa khuda toh nahin, par khuda ki kasam khuda se kam bhi nahin. (Money may not be God, but it isn't less than God either)." Finally, a secular entity-money, and not the accident of birth-is deciding the hierarchical structure in Indian society. A video clip of Shrikant Tyagi, a BJP leader according to his wife, went viral on social media. He was recorded hurling choicest abuses against a woman for speaking up against his encroachment of land in Grand Omaze housing society of Noida Sector 93. After four days and following his wife's detention, Tyagi was arrested from Meerut. He has been sent to judicial remand for 14 days. The Noida incident demonstrated that the space for rural badlands and lawless NH10s is shrinking. The feudal rustic uncouth musclemen are also losing their power and aura. Noida events display that the

says a former colleague who has worked closely with her. "If you're in a situation like we're in, where people are genuinely terrified, all this 'wrap yourself in the flag, bang on about how great Britain is' sounds tone-deaf." Truss is enviably calm in a crisis, this colleague adds, in part because she strips the emotion away from the issue. But the trouble is that sometimes emotion is key, and empathy matters. What this means for the country, if she does end up leading it through a crisis of staggering proportions, remains poorly understood. With her extensive cabinet track record and burning ambition, she's not "the Tory Corbyn". But nor is she just "Boris in a dress", although her indulgence of the ridiculous notion that the media are to blame for Johnson's wilfully self-inflicted downfall suggests similarly Trumpian tactics. She lacks

Johnson's taste for high living - any emerging scandals won't involve gold wallpaper - or his need to be loved; she has taught herself not to care what people in politics think of her. But where Johnson never seemed to know what to do with his enormous majority, Truss is a workaholic policy geek whose government would be driven by her manic energy. In the worst-case scenario, she could do more damage than he ever did. "She's a contrarian. Just because 90% of people tell her, 'This way is the way', she's not inclined to accept

that. That's not a bad quality, but it can be a problem if it's taken too far and if your default setting is that the orthodoxy is always wrong," says a former No 10 staffer, who sympathises with her argument that the Treasury isn't always right but nonetheless points out that consensus can be the consensus for good reason. "She sees the world in black and white. There's no room for fudge or grey areas." Yet the paradox of Truss is that in some ways, she can be astonishingly flexible. Under David Cameron she was a card-carrying centrist Cameron, part of what in his memoirs he called his future "dream team", alongside Nicky Morgan, Matt Hancock and Anna Soubry. Now she's the darling of the hard right. Three years ago, she backed building on the green belt so young people could own a home; not any more. She has passionately championed flexible working

India, most conversations between two strangers start like this. Obviously knowing each other's caste also helps. Even those from villages who shift base to an uber-rich urban setting or are working in a corporate setup after university education see their linkages with the past and village continue. This is even glorified as 'zameen se jude hona' or being rooted. The scholars studying early Bombay Mill workers have noticed that every year many of the labourers actually go to their villages during the sowing season. The rural feudal can use their rough language with pride and also show the power associated with it. It works. But in an urban setting, it might not be as effective as Shrikant Tyagi is realising now. How does one make sense of the event in Noida? The New Okhla Industrial Development Authority was supposed to be developed as an industrial township. It was established by an Act in 1976, on the eastern bank of the River Yamuna. Geographically, it is like a part of greater Delhi. Noida is hardly 15 km from Delhi's Connaught Place. Later

on, it expanded and became more of a residential township with lots of multi-storied apartments, villas and colonies coming up in the river plain and adjoining agricultural land tracts. At the same time, the old villages became semi-urbanised. Many of the rich and neo-rich villagers also started owning houses and flats in the apartments and colonies. But their umbilical cord with village and village communities remained intact. In the apartment blocks, rural locals and urban folks share the same spaces. Their relationship can be harmonious or cacophonous, depending on multiple factors. As a resident of a Noida apartment, I have seen that in the elections of residential welfare associations, the tension between locals and outsiders often becomes overtly palpable. Especially in elite apartments, rural rich remain in the margin and may hold a grudge against urban elites. That's why, the verbal ruckus and the turf war between Tyagi and other residents of Sec 93 society is hardly surprising. What surprised me is the promptness on the part of police and administration against the Tyagi family and MLA

reacted to this controversy. The nature of the 'crime' was not 'serious'. At best, it was an abusive rant with threats like 'dekh lunga' of a man seemingly drunk on political power. The police often negotiate a settlement in such cases. But police actions in this case like detaining Tyagi's wife, announcing Rs 25,000 reward for Tyagi's arrest and a press conference announcement by the commissioner himself give an altogether different angle to an otherwise mundane controversy. Local MP and former Union minister Mahesh Sharma sided with the other apartment owners and reprimanded the commissioner for "laxity." "We are ashamed that it's our government in Uttar Pradesh," he said on record. The police action and the way the BJP leadership acted in this case tell us a bigger story - that capitalism is pushing back rural rustic feudalism in a big way and it is of no consequence that the feudal forces are represented by powerful caste groups or ruling political parties. While acting against Shrikant Tyagi, the BJP government did not take the caste factor into consideration. Tyagis are among the dominant castes in this part of the UP. The government action must be a shocker also for the community, which organised protests against the police action. Tyagi caste organisations may think that they still carry the same weight in the power structures. This time around, they may force the government to go slow in the case against their caste brethren. But the fact remains that in the historical process, they are representing a decaying force. Capitalism and modernity might look like a meek force in such a ruckus, but as we have seen in this case, the urban English-speaking gentry has the voice and the capacity to build public opinion through social and legacy media, which plays quite an important role in the decision-making process in any democratic setup. Yogi Adityanath now wants to make his way into the hearts of urban middle classes, on his way to Lok Kalyan Marg, an ambition that can play out over the next decade.

Indiscriminate Expenses by Govt. trouble Taxpayers

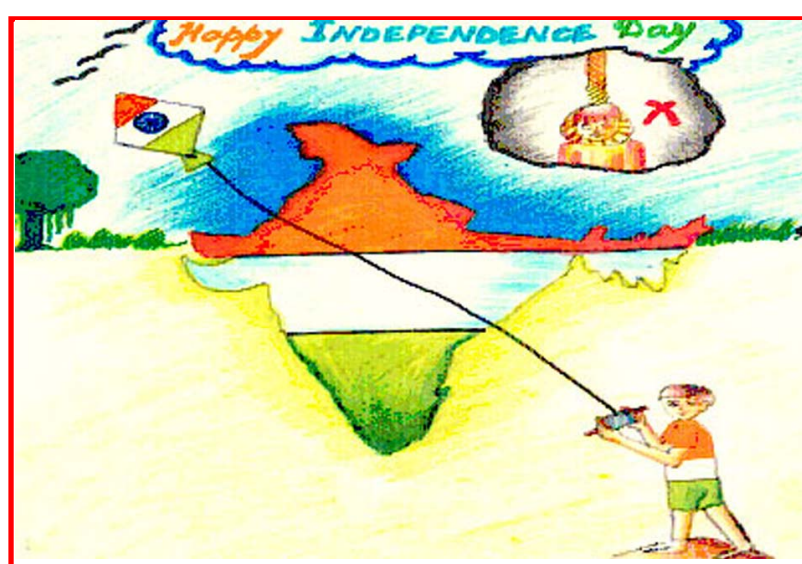
Dear Editor,

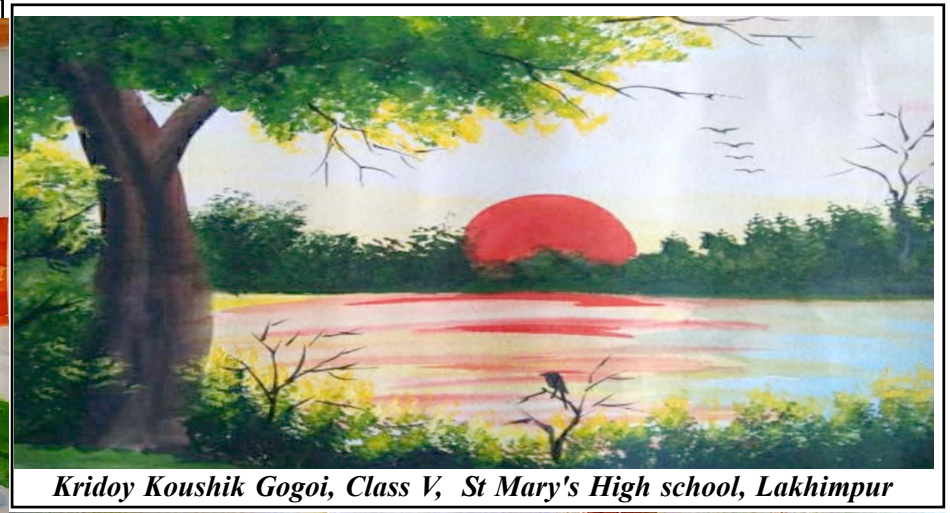

King, and he was told that the wit should only be removed without breaking the pot. Akbar knew that this could be no one else but Birbal, and he went to bring Birbal back to his court.

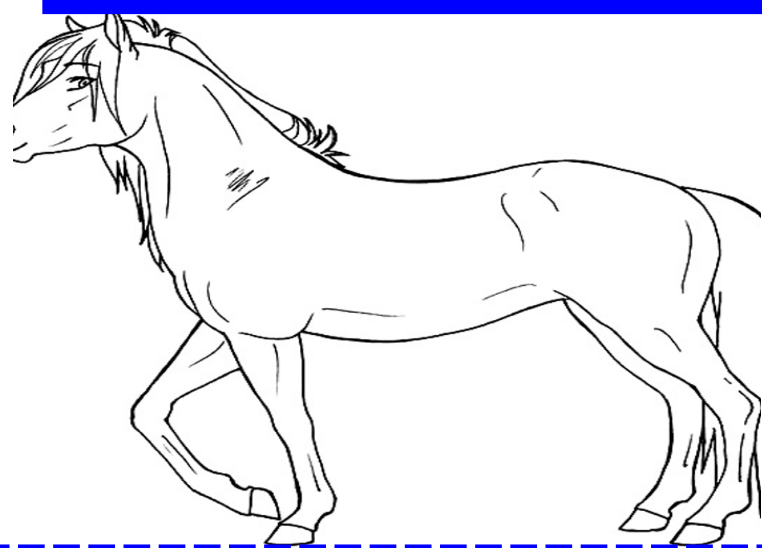

The Foolish Thief

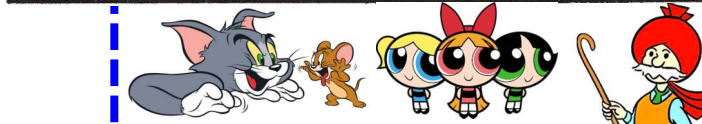
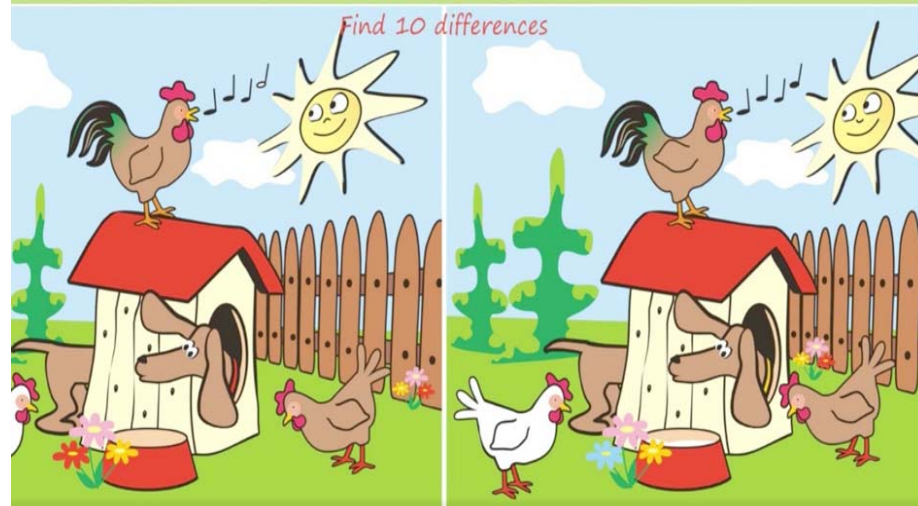

Moral : Truth always prevails.

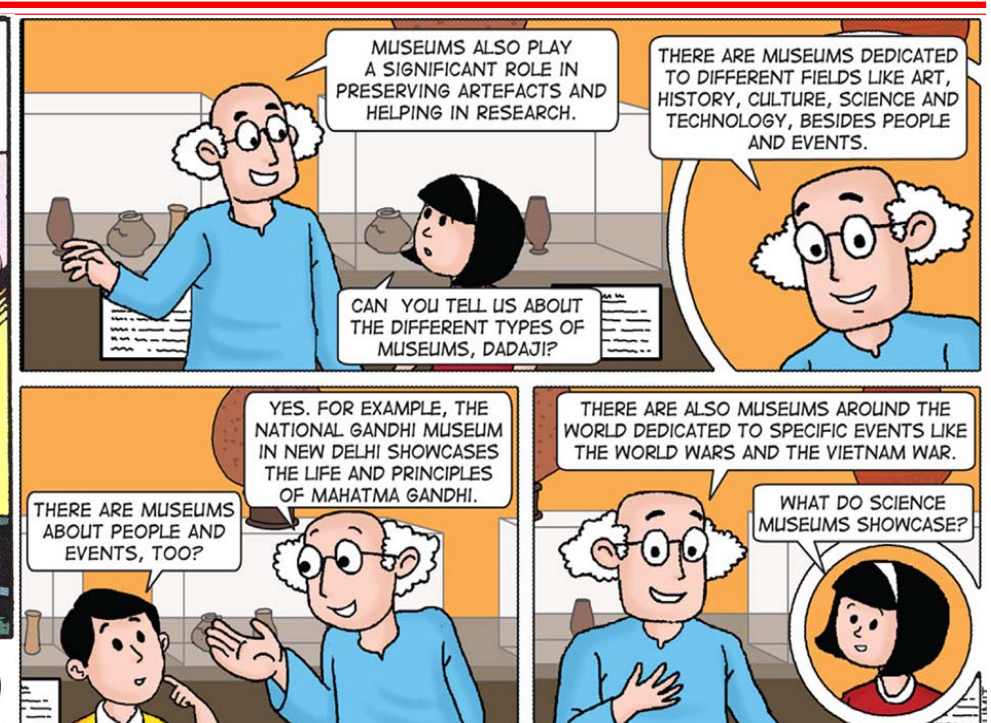

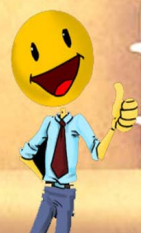
Dream to fly

alleged that the Dhula Police Station Officer in-charge had put pressure on the family members of the deceased to not file a written complaint on the unnatural death. Considering the gravity of the above allegations, the Chief Minister asked the DGP to constitute a three-member Special Investigation Team (SIT) for thorough investigation into the incident. Two of the three members of the SIT shall be females, as per the Chief Minister's order. The Chief Minister also issued instructions to concerned officials to get a house constructed for the family of the deceased under a government scheme. He also ordered the Sonitpur Deputy Commissioner to take necessary measures for inclusion of the family of the deceased under the Orunodoi scheme.

Donald Trump's Florida home

Garland, who heads the Justice Department that has oversight of the FBI, called the former President's bluff. The US Department of Justice (DOJ) has filed a motion to unseal the search warrant for former President Donald Trump's Mar-a-Lago residence earlier this week. Attorney General Merrick Garland made the announcement on Thursday after Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) agents raided the Mar-a-Lago resort in Palm Beach, Florida, on Monday, said Xinhua news agency report. Addressing the press at the DOJ headquarter, Garland said he personally "approved the decision to seek a search warrant in this matter," adding "The Department does not take such a decision lightly. Where possible, it is standard practice to seek less intrusive means as an alternative to a search and to narrowly scope any search that is undertaken." Trump and his allies have denounced the operation as a political attack orchestrated by Democrats while calling out the FBI and the DOJ. The raid was said to have involved classified materials that Trump allegedly took with him from the White House to Mar-a-Lago, when he left office in January 2021. The Presidential Records Act requires that all records created by Presidents be turned over to the National Archives at the end of their administrations. Some of the Trump presidential records received by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) included paper records that had been torn up by Trump, according to the federal agency. In January, the NARA also arranged for the transport from the Mar-a-Lago to the National Archives of 15 boxes that contained presidential records.

Over 300 participants including pregnant women & lactating mothers, adolescent girls, children of different ages, Anganwadi workers, School teachers, APART & other fisheries staff, fish Farmers, community leaders participated in the programmes. During the awareness drive, Sushil Nath, district fisheries officer, Nagaon and Dr Sanjay Sarma, Fishery Co-ordinator of APART explained about the sources of fish particularly small in community level and their consumption habits including different popular fish recipes prepared by local community at the natural resource of beel fisheries. Rituparna Pegu district nodal officer of APART in Nagaon district co-ordinated these programmes. He also spoke on the importance of such a programme at the cluster level of different development blocks of the district saying that it has a bigger impact to include small fish as a super food in the diversified diet of community people, particularly women and children, a release added. Dr Benoy Barman, senior scientist and Dr. Baishnaba Ch. Ratha, senior nutrition specialist, WorldFish elaborated the strategies for scientific Beel fisheries development and small fish production which is supposed the cheapest sources of animal protein and other important micronutrients such as vitamin A, vitamin B12, iron, calcium, zinc, and essential fatty acids. Under a diversified diet, during the critical first 1000 days of child life, the mother must be consumed higher quantities of small fish including other vegetables during her pregnancy and lactation. Dr Ratha demonstrated to ICDS Anganwadi workers and community members, particularly mothers and caretakers of children, the preparation process of small fish powder hygienically at household level with locally available small fish. Because inclusion of small fish powder in regular curry of young children have a very good long term health impact on over all development. He explained in detail about nutrition and health benefits of locally available small fishes, especially small fish eaten whole, is highly nutritious and contributes a wide range of micronutrients that benefit the health of women, adolescent girls, and children. During the programme, Prakash Kalita and Bidyut Medhi, APART consultants motivates to fish farmers that, large fish can be sold for income, while small fish are harvested regularly for household consumption or, when in excess, for sale within the community or near the market, the release said further.

Warrington survive Toulouse scare to ease Super League relegation fears

Warrington, August 12 : The Warrington coach, Daryl Powell, used his best kidology all week to try to play down the significance of this game for one of rugby league's most famous clubs. Yet the outpouring of emotion as Ben Currie crossed for the try that finally put this game - and perhaps the Wolves' relegation worries - to bed showed just what victory meant. There were Wolves players hugging. Others fell to the turf, physically and emotionally exhausted by what they had just gone through. Powell leaped from his seat and punched the air. These were the kind of scenes that Warrington, Powell and their supporters had hoped would be occurring after winning a major trophy, not moving six points clear of relegation with four games remaining. Make no mistake, had Warrington lost and fallen to within two points of their vanquished opponents, the most remarkable relegation in recent history would have been a genuine possibility. How Super League's biggest-spending club must have feared the worst at half-time. Warrington deservedly led 12-0 after half an hour, at which point



the most consequential game of the season so far felt like it may be a routine night at the office. But in a seven-minute spell before the break the hosts collapsed in spectacular fashion, and by the interval Toulouse led 18-14. Powell was lured from Castleford Tigers last winter to deliver success for a club approaching 60 years without a league title, not to scrape over the line in a relegation battle. Perhaps we all, Powell included, underestimated the size of the job he inherited, with years of big transfers failing to deliver the title this town craves. The coach wielded the axe last winter, culling long-serving players including Chris Hill. He hasn't stopped there, with

fellow England internationals Josh Charnley and Mike Cooper leaving the club mid-season as he tries to put his stamp on the Wolves. More big-money recruits from Australia are coming next year and it is becoming increasingly apparent this is not an overnight job. But unlike in recent weeks, Warrington's latest capitulation didn't cost them two points. Instead they responded after the break to score 18 unanswered points and ensure what at half-time looked destined to be a three-way battle to avoid the drop will now probably be a fight between Toulouse and Wakefield, who face Wigan on Sunday. "It's been tough,"

Powell admitted. "I've been involved in a lot of finals as a player and a coach and I was more nervous leading into this game. The obvious repercussions of losing this game, the pressure ... it was huge." Tries from Oliver Holmes and Connor Wrench had originally given the Wolves the lead and Toulouse were offering little in way of a response.

But Warrington's brittle confidence - another major failing in their season - was exposed when Corey Norman cut through for a try against the run of play. Within minutes Éloi Péliissier had followed with two quickfire tries and at half-time Toulouse led by four. Warrington's owner, the music mogul Simon Moran, paced the stands with almost palpable nerves at an interval which, for Wolves supporters, must have felt like a lifetime. He has invested millions in this club but the Championship was looking like a distinct possibility. Warrington needed to respond. And in fairness, they did. Toulouse's coach, Sylvain Houles, felt his side were harshly treated by the officials post-match, saying: "There's a few 50-50s that go against us but it's all the time, it's been like that for a few months."

Jack Draper and Dan Evans on Montreal collision course after reaching last eight



Lonfon, August 12 : Jack Draper calls for help as Gael Monfils lies stricken on the court during their last-16 clash at the National Bank Open in Montreal. Jack Draper and Dan Evans set up a possible last-four meeting after both continued their winning ways at the National Bank Open. Draper reached his first Masters 1000 quarter-final, one day after defeating Stefanos Tsitsipas in his maiden victory over a top 10 player, when 17th seed Gael Monfils retired hurt in Montreal in the second set with the British player up 6-2, 0-2. The world No 82, who came through qualifying to reach the main draw, frequently relied on his speed and reach as he claimed a fast first set. Monfils collapsed not long after securing a break early in the second,

prompting Draper to cross the court to help him into a chair as the Frenchman cried out and clutched at his right leg. Draper, 20, will face either Jannik Sinner or Pablo Carreno Busta next, with the winner of that encounter meeting Evans if the Briton wins his quarter-final. The Birmingham product continued his run of upsets with a 7-6 (7), 1-6, 7-5 dismantling of merican 10th seed Taylor Fritz, one day after he knocked out eighth-ranked Andrey Rublev. Evans roared "yes" and held his arms aloft after

qualifying for the tournament's quarter-finals for the first time, setting up a match against Tommy Paul of the US. Hometown favourite Felix Auger-Aliassime avenged his weekend semi-final loss to Cameron Norrie in Los Cabos with a 6-3 6-4 effort over the British No 1. The ninth-ranked player took just one hour and 12 minutes to defeat the 26-year-old, much to the delight of the roaring Montreal crowd, and set up a quarter-final against Casper Ruud.

Ban on transgender women playing women's rugby 'absurd', activists claim



Twickenham, August 12 : A trans activist attending England's open training session at Twickenham believes the decision to ban transgender women from playing women's contact rugby has made life less safe for her community. Emily Hamilton, the founding co-chair of LGBTQ+ rugby supporters association Quins Pride, was among a flag-waving group of around 20 people staging a peaceful protest on Thursday. They were part of a 1,000-strong crowd who watched the Red Roses as they step up preparations for this autumn's World Cup in New Zealand. The event was staged the day after the Irish Rugby Football Union

announced it is to emulate the Rugby Football Union by revising its rules for transgender women competing at grassroots level. Hamilton, who played 18 seasons as an amateur before transitioning, insists that rugby is no longer a "safe and inclusive place" after the governing bodies voted to follow the lead taken by World Rugby when it implemented a ban in the elite game. "We were part of the rugby family - I've been in rugby for nearly 40 years - but now we've been told that we're no longer part of that family," Hamilton said. "We are human beings but we are being used as a political football, being kicked about at all levels of life. We thought rugby is a safe and inclusive

place, which it no longer is. "We just want to be seen and to be visible and for people to understand that we're not the monsters we're portrayed as. We're not freaks of nature and actually in many cases we're not that different to the women you see out there on the pitch training." "It's also about the social contagion," Hamilton added.

'I want to be in the box': Sterling ready to sharpen Chelsea's blunt attack



Paris, August 12 : "Score goals," Raheem Sterling said, neatly summing up what his job is within Thomas Tuchel's intricate tactical system at Chelsea. "I think football's that simple: keep the ball out of the net and the forwards and midfielders have to score the goals." It has been a glaring weakness under Tuchel, who is clearly intent on ripping up his attack and starting again. Timo Werner and Romelu Lukaku have gone, Callum Hudson-Odoi and Hakim Ziyech could be the next to leave, and the hope is that signing Sterling for £50m from Manchester City will go a long way towards solving Chelsea's lack of ruthlessness in the final third. Sterling, who was the

first signing made by Chelsea's new owners, does not need anyone to teach him how to score goals. The 27-year-old pointed out that his best position is on the wing - "That's where I know the game like the back of my hand," he said at his official unveiling as a Chelsea player - but that was

followed by an acknowledgment that he is well suited to playing in a fluid attack. "I want to be in and around the box a lot more and trying to focus on runs more centrally," Sterling said. "But, of course, I'm here to be part of the system and play the position the manager wants me." Tuchel has choices

when it comes to where to deploy Sterling. The England forward can play on either flank, but he started in the middle on his debut in Chelsea's tepid 1-0 win over Everton last weekend. "I enjoy floating about and getting on the ball," Sterling said. "Against Everton I played as a false nine and I'll always be happy where I can be effective." Sterling looked bright against Everton. He had a goal disallowed in the first half and was unlucky not to score during the dying stages. His desire to get into goalscoring positions was clearly evident. It is one of Sterling's greatest assets, that knack of finding space in the six-yard box to finish off a low cross, and Chelsea

will be stronger if they work out how to play to his strengths. Everything suggests that this is a smart move from Chelsea. Sterling is a leader who can guide the younger players in Tuchel's squad. He thought back to his early days at Liverpool and remembered looking up to Steven Gerrard. "No matter how old you are, it's good to try to nurture younger people in whatever profession it is," Sterling said. "You don't want a hostile environment for them to come into, you want it to be one [in which] they can flourish." "When I was young I had someone like Steven Gerrard around me. When I went into the national team, he had his arm around me and that makes you a lot more relaxed around the camp so you can do your best. That's all I ever try to do. Have jokes and laugh, but at the same time get the work done and feel comfortable." Chelsea's youngsters will look up to a driven individual. Sterling, who is enjoying something of a homecoming given that he grew up in north-west London, still has so much to achieve. He was a surprise starter when City lost to Tuchel's Chelsea in the Champions League final in 2021. "I haven't played CL football with Chelsea yet," Sterling said. "They have obviously won it. I haven't. They have got the bragging rights. But again, I am here to try and win it."

Explosive Will Smeed following David Warner's path to World Cup reckoning

London, August 12 : Will Smeed could have been forgiven for wondering if he was more 90s than Cool Britannia and an episode of the Big Breakfast rolled into one (that is, if he hadn't been born in 2001 and therefore possibly unaware of Zig and Zag). The right-hander had been flirting with his first century in professional cricket all year, making eye-catching scores of 97 and 99 for Quetta Gladiators in the Pakistan Super

League, and then 94 not out and 98 for Somerset in the Blast. Last month, playing for England Lions, he also cracked a 56-ball 90 against the touring South Africans. But on Wednesday night, decked out in the Butterkist-sponsored orange livery of Birmingham Phoenix, Smeed made himself a future pub quiz answer by pummeling Southern Brave's bowlers for an unbeaten 101 off 50 balls for the first hundred in the short history of the Hundred. Though the

tournament statistically counts as Twenty20 cricket, its shorter innings - just 16.4 overs in old money - in part explain why it took a season and a bit to see a batter breach three-figures; Smeed's teammate Liam Livingstone's 40-ball 92 against Northern Superchargers last year was the previous highest score among the men. Suffice to say, Smeed didn't muck about when setting up his side's 53-run victory, muscling his half-century from 25 balls and his

next 50 runs from one fewer. Eight fours and six sixes sent roars from Edgbaston echoing around the leafy suburbs of south Birmingham and Moeen Ali, his captain, thinks higher honours are inevitable. "There's just something about him," he said. "He's got a really good hitting technique - very simple - and is strong. I watched him in the nets the other day and he just looked like an international player. You don't come across those

guys too often - Harry Brook at Yorkshire is another - where you think that "Smeed's two Lions outings this summer - the second of which is his only List A match to date - suggest he is very much on England's radar. And with Jason Roy testing their loyalty in a low-key 2022, further scores in the Hundred may yet force a spot in the squad for the T20 tour of Pakistan this September and the T20 World Cup that follows.

Serena Williams' farewell an eloquent acknowledgement of biological inequality

Washington, August 12 : Maybe Babe Didrikson, with Olympic gold medals in two separate athletics events and 10 major wins on the LPGA tour; perhaps Larisa Latynina, who won 18 medals over three Olympic Games; or Jackie Joyner-Kersey, with her back-to-back titles in the Olympic heptathlon; or Allyson Felix, who has just retired after winning more medals than any other runner in history. From Williams's sport there's Martina Navratilova, with 167 singles titles and another 177 in doubles, or Steffi Graf, who spent 377 weeks at the top of the world rankings. But all comparisons are odorous, and this one smells worse than most. Because if you've watched Williams play, listened and read what she has to say, then you have to wonder why anyone would want to try to put her, or any of them, in that one box. Why shouldn't Williams be considered a greater player than Roger Federer? Or Rafa Nadal? Or Novak Djokovic? Or the rest of the men who played in her era? She's won more singles titles than any of them, more Olympic medals too, and did it all, as they used to say about Ginger Rogers, "backwards and in high heels". As Williams wrote in the Vogue article announcing her retirement (sorry, her "evolution") from professional tennis: "I went from a C-section to a second pulmonary embolism to a grand slam final. I played while breastfeeding. I played through postpartum depression." And did it all while putting up with vast quantities of insufferable bullshit. Williams doesn't want to



quit. Not yet. She would rather play on next year and beyond. But she can't because she has to choose between having more children and having a playing career. "If I were a guy, I wouldn't be writing this because I'd be out there playing and winning while my wife was doing the physical labor of expanding our family." So here, at the end of a 27-year career spent fighting to be treated equally with the male players, is the inescapable fact that her biology still leaves her at a disadvantage. Williams compared herself to Tom Brady, but she could just as well have chosen any of those three male players from her own game. Federer, 41, won five of his grand slam titles after he became a father for the first time in 2009, three after his wife

gave birth to a second set of twins in 2014. The biggest impact having four children had on his body is that he needed surgery in 2016 because he twisted his knee while he was running a bath for them. Djokovic, 35, won five of his grand slam titles after his son was born in 2014, and three of them after his daughter in 2017. He hinted a couple of years ago that they would like to have more children. When Djokovic has talked about how fatherhood has impacted his tennis, it's often in terms of how it's taught him to be a better person, and so made him a better player. Nadal, 36, announced in June that his wife is having a

baby. So he won the French Open earlier that month while his wife was in the early stages of pregnancy, which must have been distracting for him. Williams, on the other hand, won the Australian Open in 2017 while she was two months pregnant, which, as she writes, seems "almost impossible". There was speculation that Nadal, too, might retire after becoming a father. His coach Carlos Moya doesn't think so. "I don't think paternity will induce Rafael Nadal to stop playing," Moya said when asked about it, "on the contrary, it will be an extra motivation to keep winning." For the men in her

line of work, parenthood is usually framed as an opportunity for some kind of spiritual change. For Williams, it was that and also three rounds of emergency surgery, one where she had her stomach and womb cut open, another where they found the hematoma that had flooded her abdomen, and a third where they inserted a filter in a major vein to stop more blood clots travelling into her lungs, and then spending six weeks unable even to get out of bed. Williams has spent her life dealing with double standards in the way male and female players are spoken and written about, what they're paid, the way

their behaviour is policed, and the respect they get. For the past decade, Forbes has published an annual list of the world's 100 richest athletes. Federer has been ever present in the top 10, even topped it in 2020. Williams has never made it that high, or even close to it. No woman has. Sometimes, such as in 2019, she has been the only one in the top 100. Well yes, men said. "The stats are showing that we have much more spectators on the men's tennis matches," Djokovic said in 2016. "I think that's one of the reasons why maybe we should get awarded more."

Brisbane AFL player Callum Ah Chee calls out racist abuse

Brisbane, August 12 : Brisbane Lions utility Callum Ah Chee has been racially abused online, days after being concussed in a controversial incident at the Gabba. Ah Chee, who will miss the Lions' crucial clash with St Kilda on Friday night under the AFL's mandatory concussion protocols, posted the abuse he received on Instagram. It came after Carlton captain Patrick Cripps was on Thursday night cleared of his two-game rough conduct charge on Ah Chee during a marathon appeals hearing. Ah Chee posted the abhorrent comments, before writing it was "not something

you want to wake up to". "How can this still keep happening," the 24-year-old wrote on his Instagram story. "Why can't my brothers and I just play the game we love without having to worry about shit like this." If my son grows up playing the game - I hope he doesn't have to deal with this hate. It hurts and I'm sick to death of seeing it. "Veteran Lions teammate Mitch Robinson said the comments were as "weak as it ever gets". "Fucking sick of having to see our Indigenous and multicultural players subject to racism over and over again. If you see it, even if you might know these uneducated trolls on social media keep calling it out and report them." The Lions

have reported the incidences to the AFL's integrity unit and on Friday afternoon issued a statement condemning the behaviour. "It's disgusting behaviour and we must, and we will, continue to call it out," the club statement read. "There is no place for racism in sport, or in society full stop." The AFL also hit out at the abuse. "Nobody in our game or in the community deserves to be treated that way," a league statement read. "We stand with Cal and Brisbane; there is absolutely no place for racism in our game at any level."



Commonwealth Games 2022 silver medallist Murali Sreeshankar finishes sixth in Monaco Diamond League

New Delhi, August 12 : Indian long jumper Murali Sreeshankar, who won a historic silver medal at the Commonwealth Games 2022 in Birmingham last week, finished sixth at the Monaco Diamond League 2022 in Fontvieille on Wednesday (August 10). Making his Diamond League debut, Sreeshankar logged a best jump of 7.94m at the Stade Louis II. The 23-year-old, who holds the Indian national record in the men's long jump with an 8.36m effort at the Federation Cup earlier this year, got off to a slow start in Monaco. He registered 7.61m with his first attempt before improving it to 7.84m in his second. The Tokyo Olympian managed only a 7.83m with his third jump but his second effort was just about enough to place him within the top eight after the first three rounds and get additional jumps to improve his standing. The bottom two in the 10-man field dropped out after the third series of jumps. After a disappointing 7.69m in his fourth jump, Sreeshankar rallied to produce his best effort of 7.94m with his fifth, and ultimately final, crack at the runway, just as he had done in Birmingham to win the silver medal. The jump bumped him up to the sixth position on the standings. Overall, it was an underwhelming outing for Sreeshankar, who had managed to breach the 8m mark in nine of the 12 outdoor events in 2022 heading into the Monaco meet, an olympics.com report said. In July 2022, he finished seventh in the World Athletics Championships 2022 in Oregon with a 7.96m effort while his silver-winning leap at Birmingham measured 8.08m. Cuba's Maykel Masso, who won bronze at the Tokyo Olympics, topped the group with a season best effort of 8.35m while Tokyo 2020 champion Miltiadis Tentoglou of Greece finished second with 8.31m. USA's Marquis Dendy, a former Indoor world champion, also logged an 8.31m jump but missed out to the reigning Olympic champion for the second position as the Greek athlete's second-best jump of 8.30m was better than Dendy's 8.17m. Sreeshankar will next be seen in action at a meet in Lausanne, Switzerland, towards the end of August.
